Regional and National Agendas like the Ngor Declaration should be considered as well. International conflicts should be referenced in the document e.g. SDG16. SuSanA's contribution to end open defecation should be specified. SuSanA could play a role in defining national standards and guidelines. SuSanA should discuss the sustainability of CLTS.
