Background

Improving access to sanitation is a global challenge



SDG 6.2: "By 2030, achieve access to adequate and equitable sanitation and hygiene for all and end open defecation, paying special attention to the needs of women and girls and those in vulnerable situations."



Refugee crisis: Increasing number of refugees with poor access to sanitary facilities creates conflict potential and increases risk of preventable diseases.









Sanitation for Millions

A multi-donor sanitation initiative on behalf of BMZ

Objective: Sanitation and hygiene condition in refugee host countries and countries with internally displaced people is improved

Pilot phase: Focus on <u>public institutions</u> to achieve broad impact with limited resources

Plan: With multiple donors and additional resources, initiative can expand to household level





Training of teachers, parents and students; WASH behavioral change campaigns; School competitions; Fit for School approach






Results Based Approach

- Results based allocation of funding increases value for money and mobilizes political will.


